

## THE WEAVERHAM TRUST CHAIRMANS REPORT

Over recent issues I have talked about the need for local people to actively support our village organisations or to risk loosing them.

The Weaverham Trust has been running with a depleted Executive for the last 12 months and we have now come to our own "cross roads" as a further four of its Executive Members have stated that they, due to changes in their commitments, will not be seeking re-election in 2017.

This leaves only five Executive Members, none of whom wish to take on additional key responsibilities, such as Chairman and Secretary. Given this situation, the Executive has no alternative other than to consider winding up the Trust.

Over the years since its formation in 2001 the Trust has achieved such a lot: Lakehouse Field has been registered as an open space, the construction of a large Network Rail Sub Station opposed, the village Blue Plague Scheme introduced and Bottom Pitch Meadow purchased to prevent development. There are of course many more achievements, but these are our most notable.

The Trust has a stable Membership but it is sad that a village of nearly 3,000 properties can only muster around 170 supporters. Other Weaverham organisations suffer the same problems and I see the same faces again and again on differing Committees and volunteer groups.

I'm saddened by the situation that we are now in, but, unless a number of you come forward who are able and prepared to take on these roles the Weaverham Trust will have to cease.



## **HEDGE LAYING COMPETITION - 22<sup>nd</sup> JANUARY**



The Saltscape Landscape Partnership is a 3 year programme of developments designed to protect, restore and celebrate the

salt history and wildlife of the Weaver Valley. The partnership runs over 30 projects around mid-Cheshire and is funded by the National Lottery's Heritage Lottery Fund

The Saltscape extends along the Weaver Valley from Frodsham in the north to the salt towns of Northwich, Winsford and Middlewich in the south. The area has a unique mix of wildlife habitats, post-industrial landscapes, rivers and canals that result from Cheshire's industrial salt heritage

One key aim of the partnership is to reconnect people with their landscape and heritage via a series of heritage skills events. One such heritage skill is the traditional craft of hedgelaying. Hedgelaying involves cutting part way through the stems of the hedgerow trees and laying them over between stakes to form a living fence. It is used to promote vigorous re-growth and to maintain a stock-proof barrier. Although being labour intensive, it is much better for the hedge and for wildlife than mechanical hedge-cutting.

In a bid to raise awareness of this dying craft we are holding a hedgelaying competition in Weaverham. The event will be held at the Woodland Trust owned Thorn Wood on Sunday

22<sup>nd</sup> January 2017. The event is open to professionals and novices and competitors will have about 5 hours to lay a set amount of hedge. Prizes will go the best in each category. In addition to the hedgelaying, there will be fun for all the family - including willow weaving, falconry, green woodworking and bushcraft activities.

Saltscape is led by Groundwork Cheshire, Lancashire & Merseyside with key partners Cheshire West and Chester Council, Canal and River Trust, Cheshire Wildlife Trust, The

Mersey Forest and a range of other local and national groups and organisations.
